Nordic United v. U. S. Forest Service – Returning Franklin Basin to Non-motorized Use

n Thursday, December 16, Nordic United, Bridgerland Audubon Society, Winter Wildlands Alliance, and Bear River Watershed Council filed suit against the Forest Service in U.S. District Court, seeking to restore the nonmotorized area in Franklin Basin established in the 2003 Wasatch Cache National Forest Revised Forest Plan.

The suit was brought because the Forest Service implemented a decision made behind closed doors in July 2005 that cut by over half the area in Franklin Basin originally set aside for nonmotorized recreation. The agency acted inappropriately and illegally to change the newly released Forest Plan without soliciting public input or revealing the impacts of opening this unique area to motorized winter use by snowmobiles. Such actions are direct violations

of the Federal Advisory Committee Act and the National Environmental Policy Act.

Immediately following the announcement of the Plan in March 2003, snowmobile groups appealed to eliminate the closure. BAS appealed as a friend of the Forest Service, to gain intervener status in other appeals. Two years later, the Chief of the Forest Service denied all appeals. A few days after that, Deputy Under Secretary of Agriculture Tenny upheld the Plan by not exercising discretionary review, thus ending the administrative review.

Tenny did, however, ask the Forest Service to engage the two sides in meetings to seek an alternative with "mutually agreeable final boundaries." The Forest Service complied with his direction and initiated meetings between a half dozen representatives of each side, intended to seek a mutually agreeable alternative.

Snowmobile advocates repeatedly and adamantly opposed any significant closure and the meetings degenerated into a new, untried, and as it turned out, poorly managed "medarb" process. Under intense political pressure from this handful of individuals, the Forest Service adopted the "motorized alternative" to replace the Franklin Basin closure, and immediately moved to implement it this past July without any public input or comment. This is exactly the kind of action that laws such as the National Environmental Policy Act, the Federal Committee Advisory Act, and the Administrative Procedures Act were designed to prevent.

We tried to find a solution without litigating. In August, we appealed to Faye Krueger, the new Forest Supervisor for the Wasatch-Cache National Forest. She was determined to back the outgoing Forest Supervisor's decision.

January 2006

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BAS Board of Trustees Meeting. BAS Board of Trustees meets at 7 p.m. Wednesday at the offices of Bio-Resources, 135 E. Center, Logan. All are welcome to attend.

Learn How to Attract and Feed Winter Birds. See the various types of feeders, feeds, and water devices in use locally as we visit some people who have really elaborate bird feeding and attraction setups. Bring binoculars and dress for the season. Most of the observing will be done outdoors. Leave at 9 a.m. from the parking lot between Caffé Ibis and the Logan Fire Station (50 E. 150 North). Carpooling will be available; beginning birders are welcome. We will finish up in early afternoon, but people can leave early if they need to. BAS General Meeting. This winter, BAS is partnering with Stokes Nature Center and Utah Conservation Corps to explore and discuss topics related to sustainable living in Cache Valley. In January, we'll explore the topic of building sustainable communities. Join us at 7 p.m. Thursday at the Logan City Building, 255 N. Main St. in Logan. All are welcome to attend.

Waterfowl in Winter: The Sewage Lagoons Again? We will go to the best places for waterfowl based on the weather. This will likely include starting at the Logan Sewage Lagoons, unless they are frozen over. After that we will hit other locations where there is open water on which waterfowl can survive. Meet at 8:30 a.m. at the parking lot between Caffé Ibis and the Logan Fire Station (50 E. 150 North). Carpooling will be available. If you haven't been to the sewage lagoons before, you will be amazed by the numbers and diversity of waterfowl that is there. Dress very warmly, bring binoculars, and bring a spotting scope if you have one. We will be finished around noon. Skiing, Birds, and Perhaps Beavers. Join local cross country skiing experts Jim Cane and Linda Kervin as they ski/snowshoe to what we hope will still be an active beaver colony to study the inhabitants, their architecture, and their friends. Meet at the Logan First Dam parking lot at 9 a.m.; return early afternoon. Dress warmly and bring your own skis or snowshoes—do not come without one or the other. February 2006

Antelope Island in Winter. Meet at 8:30 a.m. in the parking lot between Caffé Ibis and the Logan Fire Station (50 E. 150 North) for a morning and early afternoon of nature watching at Antelope Island State Park in the Great Salt Lake. At this time of year the bison and pronghorn are usually easy to see up close. Coyotes are almost always seen and bighorn sheep are a possibility. Unusual birds are often seen both from the causeway leading to the island and on the island itself. In past years such oddities as snow buntings, black rosyfinches and Lapland longspurs have often been sighted on this trip. Unusual waterfowl are often seen in the lake, and falcons are often seen chasing them to try to have them for dinner. Bring warm clothing, binoculars, and a lunch (or be prepared to buy something at the snack bar on the island. We'll also make a short stop at Mayor's Pond in Brigham City, where unusual waterfowl are often found in winter. We will plan to be back by mid-afternoon. In September, we went to the next level and appealed to the Regional Forester. He said, "[t]here just isn't enough wiggle room in the process to change the decision."

We had no further recourse. The Forest Supervisor suggested that if we didn't like the outcome we should go to court. After hundreds of hours of meetings and participating in good faith, we were let down by the Forest Service. Public forests are for the public, not a few motorized users. The Forest Service took a positive step in 2003 by designating another 1% of the Forest for non-motorized winter recreation (leaving 42% open to snowmobiles). We're only litigating to make Forest Service administrators listen to the public.

We are NOT litigating against the motorized users. This lawsuit seeks to compel the Forest Service to simply obey the law. We cannot afford to let such a back-room process become the norm, not after having made so much progress in open government over the last few decades.

The legal process provides each side with opportunities to respond. A hearing before Judge Dee Benson will probably be held sometime in late January or early February.

Many employees of the Forest Service understand the importance of non-motorized protections; after all, that's how we got the Revised Plan in the first place. There is still a need, however, to demon-

strate to Forest Service administrators that there are many non-motorized users who value quiet, clean, winter experiences in nature. and who have used and wish to continue to use Franklin Basin without being overrun by snowmobiles.
