### ACTION ALERT!

A pitch to provide \$5.2 million funding for “preliminary planning and engineering” for the Cedar City Water Grab (Pine Valley Water Supply Project) will be heard in NRAE Appropriations Tuesday morning, 2/1. No final decisions on this will be made until the last 10 days of the Session, but it's never too soon to tell legislators that this would be a subsidy (not a loan) of tax dollars for an unsustainable boondoggle to a water supplier with a track record of water waste and lax conservation efforts. HB 232 to create the Utah Lake Authority in the image of the Utah Inland Port Authority will likely be heard in committee this week. Contact legislators to object to a new unaccountable rogue agency that will funnel public money to private interests, and could expand their reach and run roughshod over municipalities just like UIPA has.

## News of Week Two (Week # 2)

Two of our priority bills HB 33 and 157 were approved unanimously in committee and await full House votes. Water conservation bills we support haven't moved forward yet, including Senate bills 89 and 110, and House bills 95, 115, 121, and 131 (though all but HB 95 are scheduled for a Monday NRAE Committee hearing). SB 73 passed the Senate, but may run into more opposition in the House.

New water bills emerged this week, including HB 232 (see Action Alert) and HB 240, intended to counter the Utah Lake Restoration Solutions (LRA) "Fantasy Islands" proposal. Our ally Conserve Utah Lake is behind HB 240, which may put additional road blocks in the way of LRA approval. HB 242 is a good conservation bill that would force faster universal metering of secondary water systems and require financial participation by all secondary water providers.

Utah Rivers Council unveiled a draft bill to charge a fee to heavy users of secondary water and would trigger tiered actions to transfer water to shore up the water levels of Great Salt Lake as they decline. Stay tuned!

## Budget News

The base budgets for the next fiscal year (FY 23) for all state agencies were passed this past week, so now the action turns to divvying up the one time "surplus" from FY 22 and the new revenue growth above the base (both one time and on-going). Income tax cuts of \$160 to \$200 million are still a leadership priority and are being fast-tracked so budget makers will know how much will be left to spend on programs and services.

Sen. Escamilla is sponsoring two Requests for Appropriations affecting the Inland Port. One is for \$200,000 for upgrades of two existing air quality monitors to measure hazardous air pollutants (HAPs), and the other for \$3 m. to fund a study of port-related pollution and a grant program to replace diesel loco-motives. These items are a top priority for clean air advocates.

## What's Ahead

Appropriations Subcommittees meet each morning from 8:00-10:50. NRAEQ Appropriations meets on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Standing Committees meet each day from 2-5. Both chambers will be on the floor each day from 11 to 11:50 or 12. Caucus lunches are held on Tuesday and Thursday all Session. All committee meetings and floor time are online.
